Abatacept and rituximab to be available as Limited Coverage Drugs through the PharmaCare Special Authority Program

Pharmaceutical Services Division is pleased to announce that, effective **June 30, 2008**, abatacept (Orencia[®]) and rituximab (Rituxan[®]) are eligible for PharmaCare coverage through our Special Authority Program for treatment of severely active rheumatoid arthritis, in combination with methotrexate, for patients who:

- have not responded to a trial of etanercept plus either adalimumab or infliximab, or
- have contraindications to anti-TNF agents.

All requests must be submitted by a rheumatologist. All criteria and the following forms are available in the Special Authority section of our website at www.health.gov.bc.ca/pharme/.

- HLTH 5345—Adalimumab/Etanercept/Infliximab & Abatacept/Rituximab—Initial Coverage or Switching
- HLTH 5373—Abatacept/Rituximab—Coverage Renewal

Please note that Special Authority coverage cannot be provided retroactively and that actual coverage is subject to the patient's usual PharmaCare plan rules, including any annual deductible requirement.

UPDATE RE OLANZAPINE TABLET COVERAGE

In December 2007, Pharmaceutical Services Division (PSD) issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to supply olanzapine tablets for PharmaCare beneficiaries. The RFP was issued to Eli Lilly Canada and Novopharm as the two manufacturers that were licensed by Health Canada to market olanzapine at that time.

Eli Lilly was selected as the successful proponent and PSD has entered into a listing agreement with Eli Lilly for olanzapine (Zyprexa[®]) 2.5 mg, 5 mg, 7.5 mg, 10 mg and 15 mg tablets (DINs 02229250, 02229269, 02229277, 02229285 and 02238850).

Under the Agreement, PharmaCare will continue to cover the Zyprexa[®] tablets listed above as Limited Coverage Drugs, subject to the established Special Authority criteria. Actual coverage is subject to the patient's usual PharmaCare plan rules, including any deductible requirement.

PharmaCare will not cover olanzapine tablets marketed by other vendors except in individual cases of documented intolerance to the Eli Lilly product. In such cases, the patient's physician can submit a Special Authority request for coverage of an alternative product.

In order to address concerns regarding supply disruption and/or inventory levels, Pharmaceutical Services will provide stakeholders with reasonable advance notice of any planned change in coverage for olanzapine tablets.

FAIR PHARMACARE—INCREASED ASSISTANCE AND PAYMENT OPTIONS

The Fair PharmaCare plan was designed to be responsive to the needs of individual families.

Decrease in income—Fair PharmaCare assistance is based on a family's net income from two years ago. As a result, individuals or families who experience loss of income can find it hard to meet their deductible.

Fair PharmaCare offers increased assistance if a family's net income has decreased by 10% or more in the past year.

Help with costs early in the year—We also offer a *Monthly Deductible Payment Option* for those who find it difficult to pay their prescription costs early in the year. Those who enrol in the option pay their annual deductible in equal instalments throughout the year and receive PharmaCare assistance with their prescription costs right away.

A decrease in income is not the only situation in which a family may qualify for increased assistance.

For instance, Adele and Bob receive Fair PharmaCare assistance based on their combined net income. This year, Bob had to move into residential care. His drug expenses are automatically fully covered under PharmaCare's Plan B. However, Adele's Fair PharmaCare assistance is still based on their combined income, making it unlikely she will receive help with her prescription costs.

Adele may qualify to have her husband's income excluded. If Adele meets the criteria, her Fair PharmaCare coverage could be recalculated based on her income alone.

A call to Health Insurance BC could help Adele manage her prescription costs.
